Delight yourself in the LORD, and He will give you the desires of your heart" (Psalm 37:4).

While this verse may be commonly quoted, it's also one of the most misunderstood and misapplied verses in Scripture. It's tempting to zoom in on "He will give you the desires of your heart" and neglect the first part: "Delight yourself in the LORD."

I wanted to get to the root of inconsistency in our prayer life. sometimes we get stuck ruminating over what to say and how to say it. I wonder if asking for what's on my heart is even biblical.

Are there any other overthinkers out there?

There it is. We hadn't been delighting ourselves in the Lord. We've overcomplicated what God really intended for our prayer life. We assumed our words needs to sound formal and grand, so things feels stiff and rigid.

Praying feels more like an emergency call to a stranger than ongoing communication with a loving God. All along, He just wants us to come to Him.

At the root of the word "communication," we see the word "commune." "Commune" means "to converse or talk together, usually with profound intensity and intimacy; to interchange thoughts or feelings." This was the ingredient we're missing. Consistent communication with God begins with consistent communion with God.

Think about it like this. If you only talked to a friend when you needed a favor, wouldn't your relationship start to feel transactional? Over time, one of you might eventually grow distant; the relationship might get stale, and down the road, you'd just stop talking altogether.

So many of us are in this place in our prayer lives. I'll be the first to say I've been there.

But what if it's simpler than we realize?

What if connecting with the Lord more consistently in prayer begins with being more present with Him throughout our day?

We can pray through tears. We can bring our raw, unfiltered thoughts straight to Jesus.

We can pray about the small concerns buried in our thoughts.

We can pray about our anxieties and celebrations, our grief and our gratitude.

We can bring our own needs and questions. We can cry out on behalf of others and what they're currently navigating.

We can pray out loud. We can pray in our heads. We can pray for big things, small things and everything in between. It all matters to Him because we matter to Him.

Every occasion is an invitation to pray.

Friend, God wants to hear from you. You don't have to use the "right" words or worry about how your prayers sound. Bring your whole, honest heart to Him. He already delights in you, and He's willing to listen. Start with what feels heavy or what comes to mind first. There's no better time to pray than right now.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, You know our every need. When we draw close to You in prayer, we believe You hear us. We want to trust You completely with things we're bringing to You in prayer ... relationally, financially, emotionally, mentally, physically and spiritually. Help us remember we can cry out to You in every situation, big and small. In Jesus' Name, Amen.

THE STAIN OF OIL, THE STAIN OF SIN

The clanging alerted me that there was a problem. Some sounds are not ever supposed to come out of the dryer. I hurried to the laundry room.

Yanking open the dryer door, I began pulling out my beloved's dress pants and shirts. (The load was his good stuff for church.) In the still damp pile, I found a small black lid. And then something much worse: dark greasy stains on all of the clothes. "Aww man!" I groaned loudly.

I searched through the load again trying to find the source. The black lid belonged to something.

"Your clothes are all greasy!" I called to him from the laundry room. "Do you know what this lid goes to?" He studied the object. Then suddenly remembered. It went to a small bottle of anointing oil.

My beloved is a pastor. A few days before, he and a deacon had gone to visit a very sick friend in the hospital. He'd used it there. "I must have left it in my pocket," he confessed sadly. "I'm so sorry!" The small vial of oil had completely anointed every stitch of his dress clothes.

I grabbed the spray stain remover. Anointing oil was not listed on the back. A liberal coating of Shout was applied to every splotch. I take Philippians 4:6 quite literally so invited God to get involved. "LORD, I know You are good and You always work for our good. I ask You to please, if it is Your will, let all this come out." I reminded Him what it was and why my beloved had even had it in his pocket. Then after a bit, the tainted clothes were soaked overnight in hot water and dishwashing liquid in the kitchen sink. The next day, which was Sunday-the day of new life and new beginnings-I power washed them in the washing machine in hot water right after church.

We waited breathlessly until they were dried.

Because God is gracious, generous, and kinder than I deserve, the clothes were spotless!

During the spraying and soaking process, I pondered past mistakes-with laundry and life. Sin has stained all of us much worse than a tube of oil in the dryer. Many search for something to wash it away, but there is only one thing that can do the job: Nothing but the Blood of Jesus. In the hymn *Jesus Paid it All*, Elvina Hall, wrote, "Sin had left a crimson stain, He washed it white as snow."

Because God is generous, gracious, and kinder than we deserve, when we ask, He forgives us of our sin and remembers them no more (Jeremiah 31:34).

My beloved's dress clothes will never remind me of their spots/stains. They have been washed and are clean. When the devil brings up my past sins, I need to remind him that I, too, have been washed clean.

No sin is too terrible to be forgiven, no transgression too awful. First John 1:9 reminds us, "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness."

A clean slate is a beautiful thing.

Prayer reminds us we are not in control and keeps us close to the One Who is.

It's hard to hear God's voice when you've already decided what you want Him to say.

God never said you won't go through valleys, but He did say that you never have to go through them alone.

WHAT DO I NEED TO DO?

God can not only be trusted with your problems; He can be trusted with your life and your future. He may have had to chase you all the way where you are. He wants to help you. (Don't you NEED help?!) It may be time to fully surrender to Him or turn back to Him. You will know which one it is.

To surrender to Him, to give Him your life, it just takes a few simple steps. 1) Admit that you are a sinner. (We all are!) 2) Pray and ask God to forgive you. It doesn't take a lot of big words. You can pray a simple prayer. Dear God, I know I have sinned. I believe that You sent Your Son Jesus to die for my sins and make a way for me to go to heaven. Please forgive me of all my sins. Please come into my heart and help me live for You. And please take me to heaven when I die. Thank You for loving me. Amen.




